Further Thoughts for After the Pre Public Examinations

It's not unusual to feel anxious during exam periods, but it's important to look after yourself during your revision. That doesn't mean don't do any (quite the opposite!) but try to help yourself with some simple techniques. Below are nine ways to help beat that revision stress.



Redgrave College (Year 7): Assessments – T3

Please note that when we return after the half term break, in our second week back, our Year 7 students will be sitting their third round of assessments. Teachers will be setting revision homework to prepare the students for their tests, which will take place from Monday, 4th March to Friday, 8th March 2019.

STEM Club Update

This week pupils were continuing with their practical investigations. They were using the techniques they had tried and tested to work out the actual density of pure bronze and copper metals. They then compared these results with their coin results from the previous week to see if their coins were actually made from Copper or Bronze. In alignment with their research, many found that copper coins were in fact not made of copper at all. It was not until they tested some older coins that they started to see and think about how coins have changed in their make up over the years. Next week pupils will be using what they have learnt from these investigations to start looking into silver 5p and 10p coins. Will they work out what they are actually made from? Could it be that they find some fake coins? All will be discovered after next week's practical!

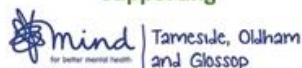
