Covid-19 Testing

Thank you for your continued support with Covid-19 home testing. We know how important it is for you to be able to send your children to school.

Please can you encourage your children to continue testing at home, and report results twice a week, via our website <https://www.mossleyhollins.com/student--lateral-flow-testing/62061.html>, throughout the October half-term school holiday and take a test before returning to school. All results should be reported, even if your result is negative or void.

Testing is free of charge; your children can collect home test kits from their Head of Year's office and bring them home with them. Please check if your child has received enough of these test kits to continue testing over the half term break.

By testing your child twice a week over half term, you will help us to reduce transmission of Coronavirus, keeping your child in school and keeping Mossley Hollins open to minimise disruption to their education and to you and your household.

Spanish Film Club




The National Influenza Immunisation Programme 2021 to 2022

Last year saw the roll out of the biggest NHS influenza vaccination programme ever, with the aim of offering protection to as many eligible people as possible during the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic.

As a result of non-pharmaceutical interventions in place for COVID-19 (such as mask-wearing, physical and social distancing, and restricted international travel) influenza activity levels were extremely low globally in 2020 to 2021. As a result, a lower level of population immunity against influenza is expected in 2021 to 2022. In the situation where social mixing and social contact return towards pre-pandemic norms, it is expected that winter 2021 to 2022 will be the first winter in the UK when seasonal influenza virus (and other respiratory viruses) will co-circulate alongside COVID-19.

Seasonal influenza and COVID-19 viruses have the potential to add substantially to the winter pressures usually faced by the NHS, particularly if infection waves from both viruses coincide. The timing and magnitude of potential influenza and COVID-19 infection waves for winter 2021 to 2022 are currently unknown, but mathematical modelling indicates the 2021 to 2022 influenza season in the UK [could be up to 50% larger than typically seen](#) and it is also possible that it will begin earlier than usual.

Influenza vaccination is therefore an important priority this coming autumn to reduce morbidity and mortality associated with influenza, and to reduce hospitalisations during a time when the NHS and social care may also be managing winter outbreaks of COVID-19.

As a temporary measure, the programme has been extended this year to 4 additional cohorts in secondary school so that all those from years 7 to year 11 will be offered vaccination. Vaccinating children reduces transmission of influenza and JCVI have recommended that expanding into secondary schools, particularly as COVID-19 is still circulating.

All children aged 2 to 15 (but not 16 years or older) on 31 August 2021 are eligible for the NHS influenza vaccination.

School Expectations

Equipment

Students who wish to succeed at our school always bring the right equipment, for the right lessons, each day. Students do not need to bring all of their books but should select the right ones the previous evening. Students must bring to school: pencil case; the 2ps and 2Rs (pen, pencil, ruler & rubber); their planner; DEAR-reader; Correct coloured lanyard; the books and folders for that day; their PE kit when they have PE and a scientific calculator.



Punctuality

We would like to remind everyone of the importance of arriving to school promptly each morning. Should you child arrive later, they must enter through pupil reception by crossing the bridge. This applies to students in all year groups.

School Shoes

We would like to remind parents, carers and students of the footwear, which will be deemed acceptable and unacceptable. Footwear must not resemble trainers and shoes manufactured by sportswear companies will not be allowed. Canvas or leather converse/vans style pumps will not be allowed, nor will any footwear that covers the ankle. Please be aware that some companies market shoes as school shoes but in fact, they are not acceptable as they have logos and/or trainer like soles. Other shops, such as Clarks have also begun to design their school shoes to look like trainers. Shoes must be all black including the stitching, sole and trim. Logos of any kind are not acceptable, including Kickers. If students arrive in school with inappropriate shoes, they will not be permitted into lessons.


